Augusta currently works at the City of Parramatta, leading the development of the City's Cultural Strategy.

After graduating, and further studies, she ultimately launched a freelance career as a pen for hire, writing and editing. Marg continues to enjoy facilitating other's writing journeys through creative writing groups, workshops and private coaching.



DR WENDY MICHAELS OAM FESTIVAL DIRECTOR 2015-2017

Dr Wendy Michaels OAM is an Honorary Lecturer in the School of Humanities and Social Science at the University of Newcastle. Her research interests include women in politics and the arts. Her publications include academic articles, teacher resource books and children's poetry, stories, plays and a picture book. Wendy is currently completing a biography of Millicent Preston Stanley, the first women elected to the NSW Parliament and has directed drama and literature festivals including the Shakespeare Globe Centre Australia, the Ourimbah Children's Literature Festival and the Rose Scott Women Writers' Festival. She was awarded an OAM for her services to women and to the dramatic arts.

She currently chairs the ATYP Foundation. She was awarded life membership of the Copyright Society of Australia for her services to creators and copyright and has served on several NSW Bar Committees, including as Chair of the Bar's Media Awards and its Alternative Dispute Resolution Committee. ALLY BURNHAM CURATOR 2023

Ally Burnham is an AWGIE winning screenwriter, NIDA graduate (2016, Masters Writing for Performance), novelist and writer of comics. She is best known for her feature film <u>Unsound</u> (2020), nominated for Best Original Feature at the 2020 AWGIE awards. The film won Best Australia Feature at the 2020 Melbourne Queer Film Festival, Best Fiction Feature Film at the 2020 ATOM Awards, and was nominated for Best Indie Feature at the 2020 AACTA awards. Ally is the lead writer for <u>Metropius</u>; her short film screenplay won Most Outstanding Animation at the 2022 AWGIE Awards.



SARA MANSOUR CURATOR 2023

Bankstown Poetry Slam (BPS) is Australia's largest poetry slam and was founded in 2013. BPS has partnered with a number of leading organisations and festivals over the years such as Youtube, Sydney Festival, the Biennale of Sydney, Sydney Writers' Festival and the Art Gallery of NSW. Having graduated from a Bachelor of Laws from Western Sydney University in 2016, Sara is also a practising lawyer and board member of Monkey Baa Theatre Company and the Crescent Institute. She uses her practice and her art to shed light on issues of political and social importance and to drive change. Sara has been heavily involved in community work and the arts since the inception of BPS, performing and facilitating workshops locally and internationally, and curating "Real Talk", – an awardwinning inter-school poetry program which uses performance poetry as a medium to discuss contemporary social issues and empower young people in Western Sydney to find and use their voices.

DETAILS	Words and Pictures brings together two accomplished and inventive writers whose new novels throw fresh light on art, creative process, and the life of the imagination. Angela O'Keeffe's <u>The Sitter</u> is inspired by the life of Marie-Hortense Fiquet, the wife of Paul Cezanne. She posed for dozens of his paintings, so we know her face, but not her story. In Jen Craig's <u>The</u> <u>Wall</u> , a woman returns to Australia to clear out her father's house, with an eye to transforming its contents into an installation in the tradition of a well-known Chinese artist. Complications follow. Angela O'Keeffe grew up with nine siblings on a farm in the Lockyer Valley, Queensland. She completed a Master of Arts in Writing at UTS, and her first novel, Night Blue, was shortlisted for the UTS Glenda Adams Award for New Writing and the Prime Minister's Literary Awards. She was awarded the 2023 Varuna Eleanor Dark Fellowship. Jen Craig is the author of the novels Since the Accident and Panthers and the Museum of Fire, which was longlisted for the 2016 Stella Prize, and most recently Wall. Her short stories have appeared in literary journals on both sides of the Pacific, and her libretto for Michael Schneider's chamber opera A Dictionary of Maladies was performed in Switzerland in 2005. Jen holds a doctorate on transgenerational trauma, anorexia and the gothic, and lives on Darug and Gundungurra lands.

DETAILS	Award-winning author Michelle Arrow brings together three generations of women to revisit the transformative era of the Whitlam government. The Whitlam era was a period of trailblazing change in almost every area of government. The Whitlam government transformed Australia. However, what is largely overlooked in accounts of this period is the scope and scale of Whitlam's reforms for Australian women. The Whitlam government appointed the first women's advisor to a national government – a world first – and reopened the equal pay case. It extended the minimum wage for women, introduced the single mother's benefit, ensured cheap and accessible contraception, funded women's refuges and women's health centres, introduced accessible, no-fault divorce and the Family Court, introduced paid maternity leave in the public service, and much more. At a moment when women are once again discovering their political voice, this book brings together three generations of women – those who worked to achieve the Whitlam government's reforms for women, academic commentators and contemporary women – to revisit the revolution in order to build on it for the future.

On stage, Heather has performed in more than fifty theatre productions — including her most recent performance as Ruth Bader Ginsburg in the one-woman show **RBG**: **Of Many**, **One**. She is a director of the Sydney Theatre Company. In 2020, she received a Member of the Order of Australia for service to the Performing Arts and the Community.

Jackie Bailey is a writer and independent funeral director, living and working on Dharawal country in the Illawarra. Her debut autofiction novel, **The Eulogy**, was published by Hardie Grant Books in June 2022. Jackie has received numerous awards for her work and has a PhD in Creative Writing. Jackie has a background in arts and creative industries research and has spearheaded work on justice, equity, diversity and inclusion in the arts. Jackie is also an ordained interfaith minister and is currently working on a book which explores how to live a spiritual but nonreligious life. She created and edited **Unbreakable** which featured stories women writers had never told before and was published just before the Harvey Weinstein revelations. Her most recent non-fiction work is **Accidental Feminists**, about the fate of women over 50. **The Mother** is her first novel for adults.

Jane Howard is a Walkley award-winning journalist and Arts and Culture Editor of The Conversation. Prior to joining The Conversation she was a freelance journalist and critic for ten years. Her writing has appeared in publications including the ABC, the Guardian, Meanjin and the Sydney Morning Herald, and she sits on the board of Writers SA.

JEN CRAIG



Jen Craig is the author of the novels **Since the Accident** and **Panthers** and the **Museum of Fire**, which was longlisted for the 2016 Stella Prize, and most recently Wall. Her short stories have appeared in literary journals on both sides of the Pacific, and her libretto for Michael Schneider's chamber opera **A Dictionary of Maladies** was performed in Switzerland in 2005. Jen holds a doctorate on transgenerational trauma, anorexia and the gothic, and lives on Darug and Gundungurra lands.

Jessica Chapnik-Kahn is an Argentinian-Australian singer-songwriter, actor and writer. As an actor, she has appeared in plays and TV, and musically has worked with some of Australia's finest artists as well as releasing two solo albums under the moniker Appleonia. She collaborated with Ben Lee on 4 albums, including the ARIA and AFI award-nominated soundtrack for Joel and Nash Edgerton's film **The Square**. She is the author of children's book **Lenny and the Ants**, poetry collection **MADRE**, and co-author of the biography **A Repurposed Life**, which was nominated for an ABIA award for biography book of the year 2021.

JESSICA DETTMANN



Jessica Dettman is the author of three novels, **How To Be Second Best**, **This Has Been Absolutely Lovely** and **Without Further Ado**, and has also written one children's book, **There's No Such Book**. She previously worked as a book editor and her blog, **Life With Gusto**, turned a sharp but affectionate eye on modern parenthood.

JUDY SMALL AM



Judy Small is one of the most influential singer/songwriters to come out of Australia. Her songs, which include one of the hardest-hitting looks at the effects of war, "Mothers, Daughters, Wives," and the ecologically minded tune "Charlesworth Bay," have been covered by Ronnie Gilbert, Eric Bogle, the McCalmans, the Corries, Charlie King, and Priscilla Herdman. The Oakland Tribune referred to Small as a "writer of some of the most powerful social and political songs of our time." A highly educated woman, Small has studied psychology and is also an attorney, balancing her musical career with work as a family lawyer for Victoria Legal Aid in Melbourne. In 1990 she received a prestigious Mo Award as Folk Performer of the Year, and in 1993 she was honored with a tribute concert of her songs at the Maleny Folk Festival in Queensland. Released in 1997, Small's album Three Sheilas was recorded with Australian vocalists Kavisha Mazzella and Bronwyn Calcutt and featured solo tracks along with tunes performed as a trio. In June 2013 she was made a Member of the Order of Australia (AM) for her contribution as a songwriter and recording artist to folk music. Judy received the National Folk Festival Lifetime Achievement Award in 2022.

JUMAANA ABDU



Jumaana Abdu is currently working on her debut novel. In 2023, she won the Dal Stivens Award and came runner-up for the Peter Carey Short Story Award. She was a Wheeler Centre Next Chapter fellow in 2022. Her work has been published in Kill Your Darlings, Westerly, The Griffith Review, Overland, and Debris. During the day, she is a junior medical doctor. K.T. MAJOR



K.T. Major was born and raised in Singapore before moving to Sydney in 2013. She studied communications, drama and performance at Nanyang Technological University. In her first year dipping into Australia's literary scene, K.T. won the 2022 Peter Cowan 600 Short Story Competition in the novice category, and placed in the top 30 for the SBS Emerging Writers' Competition. Her stories have been published in the Grieve 2022, BAD Western Sydney, and Emergence print anthologies. She is working on a crime novel that mixes genres and incorporates her experiences from Asia and Australia. K.T. lives in Dharawal Country, Sydney with her husband, son, and overactive kelpie. She writes when everyone is finally asleep.

KATE FITZPATRICK



Kate Fitzpatrick is an actor and writer. Perth-born, Adelaide-raised Fitzpatrick graduated from NIDA in 1967. During the 1970s she was in the original Australian stage production of The Rocky Horror Show and appeared in plays including The Legend of King O'Malley and Patrick White's The Season at Sarsaparilla (1976). Fitzpatrick wrote a column in the Sydney Morning Herald in the early 1980s, and in the summer of 1983-1984 was a cricket commentator on the Nine Network. Her **Name dropping: An incomplete memoir** was released in 2004; **Airmail**, letters between Fitzpatrick, her mother and her sister, followed in 2005.

KATE FORSYTH



Kate Forsyth is an award-winning author and storyteller. She wrote her first novel aged seven & has now written more than forty books for both adults and children, translated into more than twenty languages and selling more than a million copies. Her historical novels include The Crimson Thread, Beauty in Thorns, The Wild Girl & Bitter Greens, which won the 2015 American Library Association Award for Best Historical Fiction. Searching for Charlotte: The Fascinating Story of Australia's First Children's Author was co-written with her sister Belinda Murrell and longlisted in the 2021 Australian Indie Book Awards. The Rebirth of Rapunzel: A Mythic Biography of the Maiden in the Tower won the 2017 William Atheling Jr Award for Criticism. Her children's books include Vasilisa the Wise & Other Tales of Brave Young Women, which won a silver medal in the 2018 US Readers Favorite awards, and The Impossible Quest which was shortlisted for the REAL Awards in 2017. The Silver Well, a collection of stories co-written by Kim Wilkins, won the 2017 Aurealis Award for Best Collection, with one of Kate's stories, The Cunning Woman's Daughter also winning the 2017 Aurealis Award for Best Fantasy Novella. Kate has a BA in literature, an MA in creative writing and a Doctorate of Creative Arts, and is an accredited master storyteller with the Australian Guild of Storytellers. She runs creative writing retreats in Australia, Greece, and the UK, and tells stories worldwide.

KATE ROSSMANITH



Kate Rossmanith is an ethnographer, a nonfiction writer, and an Australian Research Council Future Fellow. She is co-founder and Deputy Director of the Creative Documentary Research Centre, leading the portfolio **Writing**, Language, Narrative. She is the author of Small Wrongs: How we really say sorry in love, life and law (nominated for national and international literary awards), and co-editor of the collection **Remorse and Criminal Justice: Multidisciplinary perspectives** (Routledge 2022). Kate is Associate Professor of Media, Cultural Studies and Creative Writing at Macquarie University. She holds a Bachelor of Arts (Hons) degree and a PhD from the University of Sydney.

Never!** written with her daughter Lisa Hathorn-Jarman, won the CBCA Children's Picture Book of the Year Award, Younger Readers, 2021, Hachette Australia.

Melanie is a writer for stage and screen with a proven track record in Australia and the UK. Her play The Appleton Ladies' Potato Race premiered at the Ensemble Theatre in Sydney in March 2019 and toured nationally in 2021. The play has been programmed right around Australia and New Zealand including at the State Theatre Company of South Australia and upcoming productions at Queensland Theatre and The Court Theatre in Christchurch. Melanie also adapted the play into a feature film, writing the screenplay for The Appleton Ladies' Potato Race which is post-production with Paramount+ and EQ Media. Melanie's play A Broadcast Coup, opened in January 2023 at Ensemble Theatre as part of Sydney Festival. Nadia Townsend is a writer, actor, film and theatre maker, as well as a renowned screen dramaturg with 25 years' experience in the industry. SARAH HOLLAND-BATT




