Paris Rosemont is an award-winning Asian-Australian poet. Her poetry has found eclectic homes from international literary journals and anthologies, through to quirky underground zines. Her niche is theatrical performance poetry. She has appeared at the Sydney Fringe Festival, world premiere of Slam Messiah 2022, Ubud Writers & Readers Festival 2023, and Short+Sweet Festival Illawarra 2023 where she was awarded Best Script. Her debut collection, *Banana Girl*, was shortlisted for the Dame Mary Gilmore Award 2024, and the Society of Women Writers NSW Poetry Book Award 2024. Her second poetry collection, *Barefoot Poetess*, published by WestWords Books, reclaims the word "Poetess", and a woman's fierce allegiance to her body, sexuality, her selfhood.



Tess Scholfield-Peters is a writer and academic at UTS, teaching across the Creative Writing and Communications programs. Tess has won an international prize for her academic research as well as a National Library of Australia summer scholarship for her research project: From Berlin to the Bush: Jewish Youth in Rural Australia 1939. Her PhD titled For Those Who Cannot Speak: new and ethical expressions of Holocaust remembrance by the third generation would become her first book, a work of narrative nonfiction titled Dear Mutzi: a story of love, escape and finding the forgotten which was published by NLA Publishing in June 2024. Tess lives and works in Sydney-Eora and is working on her second book.



Born in the UK, Cindy has lived, worked and travelled in Turkey and speaks some Turkish. She emigrated to Australia with her family in 1975 and is a graduate of Sydney University. She's been a teacher, freelance writer and tour guide in Sydney and Turkey. Cindy also visited Iran while writing her first two novels, set in Iran, the USA and Australia. She's won several awards for her books and short stories. In 2023 during a writer's residency in the UK, she revisited Turkey and the former sultan's palace to fine-tune her research for her third novel *The Favourite of the Harem*. Set in the Topkapi Palace harem of sixteenth-century Istanbul, it was published in November 2023. She is currently working on a fourth novel.


Suzanne Chick was born in Sydney in 1942 and grew up in Mosman, the

Paula Bray has over 20 years' experience working in cultural heritage institutions, including the State Library of NSW, Powerhouse Museum, Art Gallery of NSW, and the Australian National Maritime Museum. She is currently the Chief Digital Officer at State Library Victoria, leading the library's digital future through compelling digital experiences that place the visitor at the heart. Paula set up Australia's first dedicated innovation lab in a cultural heritage organisation, the DX Lab at the State Library of NSW. She developed an award-winning team that experimented with technology to build new ways to get access to the collection and its data, both online and onsite. She co-published *Open A GLAM Lab* with 16 peers from the International GLAM, (Galleries, Libraries, Archives & Museums) Labs community, highlighting the benefits of working in an experimental practice.



**LUCY HAYWARD** 

Lucy Hayward is the Chief Executive Officer of the Australian Society of Authors. She is a passionate advocate for writers and illustrators with over 6 years' professional experience in the book industry. Prior to the ASA, Lucy cut her teeth in communications at a marketing technology company before her move to bookselling, taking up the role of Marketing Manager for Sydney's Better Read Than Dead bookshop. She has a Masters in Creative Writing from UTS and has been a volunteer reader for Overland. Lucy currently sits on the board of Authors Legal, the Australian Copyright Council, and the International Authors Forum.



AMANDA HOOTON

Amanda Hooton is a senior writer with *Good Weekend Magazine*, with *The Sydney Morning Herald* and *The Age*. She is a Walkley and Kennedy Award winner, as well as a British Press Award winner, and a Scottish Press Award winner. She has written for *The London Daily Telegraph*, the *Times*, and *The New York Times*. Her Jane Austen dating guidebook, *Finding Mr Darcy*, was published in 2012.



**HANNAH KENT** 

Hannah Kent's first novel, the multi award-winning international bestseller, *Burial Rites*, was translated into over 30 languages and is being adapted for film. Her second novel, *The Good People*, was translated into 10 languages, nominated for numerous awards and is also being adapted for film. *Devotion*, her third novel, published in 2021, won Booktopia's Favourite Australian Book and was shortlisted for multiple industry awards. Her original feature film, *Run Rabbit Run*, was directed by Daina Reid and starred Sarah Snook. Kent is also the co-founder of *Kill Your Darlings*, and has written for *The New York Times, The Saturday Paper, The Guardian, The Age, The Sydney Morning Herald, Meanjin, Qantas Magazine* and *LitHub*. She lives and works on Permangk and Kaurana Country.



JANE CARO AM

Jane Caro AM is a Walkley award winning Australian columnist, author, novelist, feminist, public education activist and social commentator. She was also awarded the B&T Women in Media Lifetime Achievement Award in 2023. Once upon a time, she was a multi-award-winning advertising copywriter and an academic. These days, when not tweeting up a storm to her 190,000+ followers, she is a full-time writer, novelist, speaker, MC and TV, radio and media pundit. She has published thirteen books, including the bestselling novel *The Mother. Lyrebird* is her second novel for adults.



VANESSA TURNBULL-ROBERTS

Vanessa Turnbull-Roberts is a proud Bundjalung Widubul-Wiabul woman, who has degrees in both law and social work, and was recognised with an Australian Human Rights Medal in 2019. She is a human rights lawyer and Fulbright scholar whose current research is focused on unveiling the intersections of human rights, child removal and the implications of forcible removal, ensuring that First Nations child survivors and those impacted are heard, while providing solutions towards ending child removal. In 2024, Vanessa was appointed the inaugural Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander Children and Young People Commissioner for the Australian Capital Territory (ACT). Her first book *Long Yarn Short* was published by UQP in 2024.



ANTOINETTE LATTOUF

Antoinette Lattouf is a fearless journalist, celebrated author, and passionate human rights advocate known for her bold storytelling and commitment to championing diverse perspectives. With a collection of prestigious media and human rights awards to her name, she's rightfully earned her spot as one of AFR's 100 Women of Influence. As a TEDx speaker, mental health ambassador, and co-founder of Media Diversity Australia, she's dedicated to creating lasting change in the media landscape and beyond. As the host of *The Weekend Briefing* podcast, Antoinette engages some of Australia's most influential voices on the biggest issues of the day with curiosity, insight, and a genuine passion for meaningful dialogue. Antoinette is currently writing her second book. Her first book *How to Lose Friends and Influence White People* was published by Penguin Random House in 2022.



DR LAUREN SAMUELSSON

Dr Lauren Samuelsson holds a PhD in history from the University of Wollongong, Australia, where she is an Associate Lecturer. Lauren's research interests include cultural history, the history of food and drink, the history of popular culture and gender history. Her first book, A Matter of Taste: The Australian Women's Weekly and its Influence on Australian Food Culture was published with Monash University Publishing in 2024. Alongside her award-winning academic work, she has also published in The Conversation and is a regular guest on Australian radio, where she shares her love of food history with people nationwide.



JENNIFER WONG

Jennifer Wong is a writer and comedian. She is the co-author of Chopsticks or Fork?: Recipes and Stories from Australia's Regional Chinese Restaurants (Hardie Grant), and a contributor to Admissions: Voices within Mental Health (Upswell). Her humorous writing about food, culture, and mental health has appeared in The Guardian, SBS Food, ABC Everyday, Monocle, and The Big Issue. Jennifer is the presenter of Chopsticks or Fork? (ABC iView), and creator and host of FEAST: live community storytelling events for food and story enthusiasts. As a comedian, she has sold out shows around Australia, most recently Jennifer Wong Has No Peripheral Vision (2023) and The Sweet and Sour Hour of Power (2024).



CHARLOTTE MCCONAGHY

Charlotte McConaghy is the author of the New York Times Bestseller *Once There Were Wolves*, winner of the Indie Book Award for Fiction 2022, which is currently being developed for television; and the international bestseller *Migrations*, a TIME Magazine Best Book of the Year and the Amazon.com Best Fiction Book of the Year for 2020, which is translated into more than twenty languages and is being adapted for film. She has both a Graduate Degree in Screenwriting and a Masters Degree in Screen Arts, and lives in Sydney with her partner and two children.



TASMA WALTON

Tasma Walton is a proud Boonwurrung woman from the saltwater country of Melbourne and surrounding coastlines. Her work across both film and television has seen her nominated for multiple AACTA Awards. Tasma's first novel, *Heartless*, was nominated for an ABIA Award for General Fiction, and the first book in her children's series *Nerra: Deep Time Traveller* was longlisted for the DANZ Children's Book Award.



# **ALLY BURNHAM**

Alexandria (Ally) Burnham is an AWGIE (Australian Writers Guild) awardwinning screenwriter, novelist and writer of comics. She is best known for her feature film Unsound (Apple, 2020), which was nominated for best original feature at the 2020 AWGIE awards. A romantic-drama, the film won best Australian feature at the 2020 Melbourne Queer Film Festival and best fiction feature film at the 2020 ATOM Awards. Ally is the lead writer for Metropius (2021), a multi-media story world told across animation, comic books and board games produced by 18 Degrees. Her screenplay won Most Outstanding Animation at the 2022 AWGIE Awards. The first and second issues of her comic book, Forgotten Rose, are out now. Her debut novel, Swallow, is slated for release November 2025.



**SOPHIE GEE** 

Sophie Gee is Vice Chancellor's Fellow at the University of Sydney, where she's engaged in the public value of the humanities. She's also Professor of English at Princeton University. She's the author of scholarly monographs about the rise of the novel and the history of waste in the eighteenth century, as well as a historical novel, The Scandal of the Season, rewriting Alexander Pope's "The Rape of the Lock" as a comedy of manners, which was widely translated and named as a best book of the year in the Washington Post and the Economist. She's written regularly for many publications including The New York Times, the TLS, the Washington Post and The Sydney Morning Herald. She's held fellowships at Yale and UCLA and her new work is on the value and importance of public humanities. Sophie is a co-creator of The Secret Life of Books podcast.



NICOLE ABADEE

Nicole Abadee has worked in the book industry for many years after her previous career as a barrister. She writes about books for Good Weekend, and is also a regular contributor to their much loved "Two of Us" column. She appears regularly as a facilitator at writers' festivals and literary events. She also has a popular podcast, Books, Books, Books in which she interviews top Australian and international writers about their latest books. Nicole is also a director of the Indigenous Literacy Foundation, 2024 winner of the Astrid Lindgren Memorial Award.



KATE MCCLYMONT AM

Kate McClymont AM is an investigative journalist with The Sydney Morning Herald and one of Australia's most decorated reporters. A tentime Walkley Award winner (including the Gold Walkley), she has exposed major corruption scandals involving the Health Services Union and former NSW Labor politicians. Her acclaimed books include He Who Must Be Obeid and Dead Man Walking. In 2017, she was inducted into the Media Hall of Fame, made a Member of the Order of Australia (AM) in 2020, and received the Walkley Award for Outstanding Contribution to Journalism in 2023. Her fearless reporting has earned her numerous accolades including eight Kennedy Awards.



**SARA M SALEH** 

Sara M Saleh is an award-winning writer, poet and human rights lawyer of Palestinian, Egyptian, and Lebanese heritage. Sara's work has been published in English and Arabic across dozens of literary platforms and shared on stages from Brooklyn to Bangalore, and she has led workshops in countless classrooms, community spaces, and festivals around the world. Sara's debut novel, Songs for the Dead and the Living (Affirm, 2023), and her poetry collection, The Flirtation of Girls (UQP, 2023), have received multiple local and international prizes and shortlistings between them, and she has been awarded various honours over the years. Sara made history in Australia as the first poet to win both the prestigious Peter Porter and the Judith Wright Poetry Prizes (2020-21).



**FELICITY LEWIS** 

Felicity Lewis has been in journalism since the mid-1990s, including a couple of years in London, working in various roles as a reporter and producer and winning several team awards, including a Walkley, as multimedia editor at The Age and The Sydney Morning Herald. She has been the national explainer editor since "explainers" were launched in those newspapers at the end of 2018.



**MELISSA LEE SPEYER** 

Melissa Lee Speyer is an award-winning playwright, screenwriter and screen executive. She has worked in script development for Screen Australia and for several independent production companies across a slate of Australian films, television shows and online series for local and global audiences. A graduate of both NIDA's playwriting degree and the AFTRS Masters of Screen Arts, she is passionate about writing for performance and about Australian scripted storytelling.



**BRONTE CHARLES** 

Bronte Charles is a proud Bundjalung and Mununjali woman. She is a digital producer and journalist at NITV and has been in the industry for five years and reported on the referendum on the Voice to Parliament. She grew up all over—on Country in Beaudesert, Alice Springs, Canberra and for most of her adolescence, in Waterloo/Redfern.



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
